TEACHERS CANDIDLY SPEAK ABOUT POSSIBILITY OF RECEIVING VACCINE

The COVID-19 pandemic has been unrelenting in its impact on the world, and oftentimes stories are told about how difficult these times are for teachers and students. In January, 2021, Jennifer Wilson, an English teacher, and David Lapinski, a Math teacher, both from GAR Memorial High School offered to share their thoughts on the most recent news about these most difficult times during Covid.

Amongst concerns, the major one involved safety and the long-term unknowns with the pandemic and vaccine as well.

Wilson expressed about the outbreak, "There are so many people who are having issues with their hearts and lungs months after having recovered. As sad as this new reality is, I guess it just comes down to personal choice as to what scares you more."

When it came to their personal feelings towards planning for the vaccine, Wilson explained how neglecting to get the vaccine will affect her homelife.

"My husband and my youngest daughter have underlying health conditions that would leave them at risk for serious complications if they were to get Covid."

Mrs. Wilson opened up about her responsibilities as a teacher, specifying that because of her role she comes into contact with germs and viruses daily, remarking, "I would not be able to live with myself if I did not take every opportunity that I could to protect my family as well as anyone else that I come into contact with."

Lapinski passionately stated, "I'm getting it since I hope it would allow me to live my life without fear".

Lapinski also provided a new line of thought as it related to the reopening of schools, "Unfortunately there are many teachers that do not feel safe. If a teacher isn't feeling safe, they will not be effective teachers and the system falls apart."

"Many schools that are 'open' are missing students due to quarantine requirements. Ok they are open, but when 100 kids are out is effective teaching taking place?"

As for the recent news on the COVID-19 variant and the many lives being lost, Lapinski lamented, "It's all ugly, but it is what it is, you practice safety everyday and you hope for the best."

Both Wilson and Lapinski hope for the opportunity to see the people they teach everyday behind the screen as soon as possible.

Wilson reminded us all to, "Just BE KIND. That is all."

A: One mistake I wish I would have avoided was rushing into my launch day. When my mom told me I can do it, I felt like I just jumped right into it. I could have done more research, branded myself better, along with many other things. Now I look back at it as a lesson.

Q: What motivates you to keep going?

A: The day I started my business page made me realize to never give up. Sometime in the summer of 2019, I posted that I was going to be starting my business. I had 50+ shares of so many people telling me how happy and excited they were for me. From that day forward, I knew how much support I had behind me and to never give up.

Q: Who or what has inspired you?

A: I would have to say my family definitely inspired me the most. My grandpa owned a restaurant, my uncle caters, my grandma has a baking business. I was surrounded by entrepreneurs since I was born and I knew that if they could do it, so can I.

Q: What has been your most satisfying moment in business?

A: My most satisfying moment would have to be Black Friday 2020. On Black Friday I held a 40% off sale that started at 10 a.m. The moment 10 o'clock hit, I had 3 orders. All day I was getting orders and ended the day with a total of 15 orders! The most Orders I've had at once.

Q: How did you raise funding for your venture?

A: As I mentioned before , my uncle has a catering business. I worked for him all summer in 2019 and at the end of the summer I put all the money I made into my brand.

Q: What piece of advice would you give someone who wants to start a business or wants to become an entrepreneur?

A: If you're thinking about starting a business, absolutely go for it. Don't worry about who already does it and who doesn't want you to do it. If you have a passion for something, never let anyone get in the way of your love for something. No matter what you choose to do, you will be amazing at anything you set your mind to!

Q What do you think is the biggest challenge that students face?

A "This year? Separation. The distance from familiar learning, from interaction with classmates, from relationships with faculty cannot be overcome no matter the bandwidth, wifi speed, etc."

Q Have any of you lesson plans been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic?

A "English class was the focus of the film "Dead Poets Society" and I taught Creative Writing at the Higher Achievement Program. In general, I prefer the subjectivity of literature and writing. DISNEY/PIXAR CREATE A MOVIE FOR ALL TO ENJOY


