

Butler claimed that spirit week should have been held at the beginning of the year when students were excited for school and were still allowed to attend school in person, while committing to safety procedures.


Due to the latest order by Governor Wolf, all athletic and basketball games are on hold until January 4th 2021.

Opinion Editorial: We Need to do More in Recognizing Child Abuse



Child protective services need improvement when it comes to the handling of its cases and the identification of such cases. There are too many stories where a narrative is taken at face value and not looked into further, or victims are taken out of a horrible situation just to be put in a potentially worse scenario. This is something that is not talked about enough, if at all. There are people to this day that cry silently for help or refuse to seek it at all. We cannot allow such circumstances to continue to be ignored.

Whenever an agent is sent to investigate a case, they usually interview the potential victims, then search their homes and interview the accused abusers. This is a fair way of going about it except that it allows agents to be overcome by the image presented to them in those brief interviews, and are led astray.

A child can and will lie if they believe their pain is deserved or will benefit them more so than receiving assistance from strangers who could never understand them. Of course there is the argument that this doesn't make sense because, "Why would someone not take an opportunity to better their lives if there is clear injustice and trauma being pushed onto them?"

No one ever chooses to live in despair. While this outlook is not necessarily wrong, most victims will admit to their abuse and try to help their situation. But that leaves the other percentage of people that think differently. If they

believe that allowing others into their lives will cause more harm than good, they will try their utmost to maintain an image of a nuclear life.

A victim may be ordered to lie by their abusers and obey without realizing the true potential that their testimony holds. If a victim fears having custody handed over to an individual or group that is similar or perhaps worse, they might strive to deceive. Yes, a potential victim's word should be trusted, but it shouldn't be relied on. It can be proven false just like any testimony given by an abuser or an accuser.

And another thing. A supposed lack of evidence does not necessarily mean that danger does not exist, people can hide wounds with makeup or clothing. And even so, the lack of physical injuries that are apparent does not mean that someone doesn't get a lamp thrown at them for using body cream incorrectly. It doesn't mean they don't get lectured day in and day out for writing their name a little messily, or that their fingers aren't threatened by a pair of scissors. If there is the slightest inkling, it should be investigated more. Obviously not in a way that would seem intrusive, but cases should be given another look. People shouldn't have to wait until they move out to be able to talk about their experiences without fear of their life being ruined. You don't need a weapon to leave an impression. Whether it be with a belt, or a pipe, or empty handed, there is no room for debate, it's abuse. I say this because agents have walked away from cases where assailants admit to their crimes, but are given a pass because they were empty handed or they were justified in doing so. These agents need to be fired. How can someone in their right mind be okay with that sort of situation unless they themselves fall into the cycle or are simply too ignorant to have the job.

The job of an agent is not to prove that a situation is not damaging, it is to save the people that fall victim to these kinds of situations. It's unfair that the people who are too scared or too narrow minded to speak up for themselves get left behind by not only the people who neglect them actively, but by the world; by the people who have the power to DO something. Social services should be a service that actually helps people.

Please don't let these people go unnoticed. Do better at educating people on these sorts of scenarios and have resources available for people who might need them. And finally, when a victim does come forward, please don't throw them into the hands of someone just as bad, or worse. We can't keep ignoring these people any longer, especially now that they have to be trapped in a house all day with harmful people during quarantine.
